

City of Eagle River Announces Silver Lake Road Construction and Seasonal Beach Closure

EAGLE RIVER, WI – The City of Eagle River will begin Silver Lake Road reconstruction beginning Monday, August 11, a project aimed at improving road safety, infrastructure, and long-term accessibility for residents and visitors.

To accommodate the construction work, Silver Lake Beach will be closed for the remainder of the 2025 season beginning Monday, August 11. The closure is necessary to ensure public safety during the reconstruction period.

During the project, detour routes will be established via Dollar Lake Road off of Highway 70 East. This route will provide continued residential access as well as access to the T-Docks boat landing.

"We appreciate the community's patience as we make these important infrastructure improvements," said Robin Ginner, City Administrator of Eagle River. "The reconstruction will enhance safety, extend the life of the roadway, and improve access for years to come."

Residents and visitors are encouraged to plan ahead for detours and to stay alert to construction signage in the area. Updates on the project will be posted on the City of Eagle River website at www.eagleriverwi.gov. The project is funded, in part, by the Wisconsin Department of Transportation LRIP/MSID grant program.

The Caregiver Alliance of the Northwoods Mission is to support, educate, and advocate for those who give and receive care.

TIP OF THE MONTH: Did you know that warmer weather and some medications do not mix! BE AWARE of what you and your care partner are taking. Some medications make you more prone to dehydration and/or sun sensitivity. Common culprits (not an all-inclusive list):

- ✓ St. John's Wort
- ✓ Certain types of antibiotics (I.E. quinolones, tetracyclines, sulfonamides)
- ✓ Some anti-inflammatory medications (I.E. ibuprofen, naproxen)
- ✓ Different diuretics or "water pills" (I.E. furosemide, torsemide, hydrochlorothiazide)
- ✓ Heart rhythm medications (I.E. amiodarone, quinidine)
- ✓ Statins or cholesterol medications (I.E. simvastatin, atorvastatin)
- Certain diabetes medications (I.E. sulfonylureas-glipizide, glyburide, glimepiride)

Use caution in warmer weather, know your medications effects, take measures to prevent issues by staying well hydrated, limiting time in the hot sun, cool down and rest when needed.

Hello Everyone!


While we are in the final month of our summer, the Eagle River Historical Society has lots planned for the community in August and much more to come as we approach the fall! This month we will be having our Annual Member's Meeting on Aug. 10th, our Canoe Race which has been re-scheduled for Aug. 20th, and the remainder of our Summer Lecture Series. Our Museums are Free to the Public and will remain open from 11:00am to 3:00pm every Thursday and Friday until September 5th.

Some of the exciting work we have done this summer is we have launched our new YouTube Channel! Our channel has over 30 original Historic Films of Eagle River and the Northwoods, most of which are from 1939–1945, the oldest one we have online is of Lake Forest/ Eagle Waters Golf Course from 1917! If you have any historic film that you have in your closet,



basement, or some dusty shoebox please let us know! We have 16mm and 8mm projectors that can play original films and would allow us to digitize and share these local films online!

What you can expect this fall however is the addition of over 1,000 images to our Online database of Historic Photographs, which means you can do personal searches on Local Family Histories, Downtown, Resorts, Farming, Native Americans and much more! At the moment we already have 1,400 available for FREE public viewing, but if you or someone you know has historic images of Eagle River or Vilas County, please reach out to the Historical Society! We will be happy to scan them and return them so we can make them available online and open to the public while you can keep your family heirlooms!

At the moment we are in the middle of two very large projects. Right now N.P.S.D. Students have been scanning our shared yearbook collections which we hope to have online before or by Christmas. The second project, which we are excited to start is scanning the City of Eagle River's Tax Assessment Rolls from the early 1890s through the late 1980s. While these records are public, they are currently not available online. Now, what makes this project so important is that it helps the Historical Society establish firm ownership of downtown business and historic properties. This will be a major project and take years to finish, but we are happy to get a start!

In addition to all of this, this fall we will be re-launching our Historic District Lecture series where we delve into the history of each building located within the historic district. That means we go as far back as our records can indicate and we work our way up chronologically to its current owners. The lectures are free for the public to attend and the schedule of which buildings will be featured will be released soon! We look forward to seeing you there!

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The Northwoods Housing Region has been granted over \$1.5 million from the state to provide you, our residents, with no interest loans for housing rehabilitation projects. If you reside in Vilas County and your household does not exceed the maximum income limits—you may be eligible. Landlords are also eligible for rehabilitation loans used to improve housing for low and moderate income tenants.



REHABILITATION LOANS

Owner Occupied and Rental Units

Eligible homeowners and landlords renting to low to moderate income tenants are eligible for no interest loans for eligible improvements. Eligible improvements are those necessary to bring a home up to decent, safe, and sanitary conditions. These elements include, but are not limited to:

- Accessibility improvements
- Plumbing and electrical repairs
- + Basement and foundation repairs
- Furnaces and hot water heaters
- + Gutters and down spouts
- New roofs and chimney work
- + Siding and painting
- Storm doors, windows, and insulation
- Sewer lateral repairs
- Materials for eligible projects
- Lead-based paint removal/hazard reduction



ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

- + You must live in Vilas County,
- You and your household must not exceed the income limits listed below.

LOAN TERMS

Owner Occupied Loans

- All homes must be located within the Vilas County limits.
- paid full The loan must **CDBG** Housing to the County's Rehabilitation Program once home or vacated sold. transferred. for any is

Renter Occupied Loans

- All rental units must be located within the Vilas County limits.
- Renter occupied loans are only for rehabilitation purposes.
- Rental unit loans are available for landlords renting to low/moderate income (LMI) tenants. The landlord must continue to rent only to households that do not exceed LMI limits for a period of five years, or the term of the loan, whichever is less.
- + Thirty days after closing papers are signed, the landlord will begin making monthly payments to repay the loan to the Housing Rehabilitation Program. The term will vary between three and seven years.

Am I Eligible?

Eligible applicants must:

- · Be without modest, safe housing
- Be unable to get a loan from other resources
- Agree to occupy the property as their principle residence
- Be legally able to acquire a loan obligation
- Meet U.S. citizenship or eligible noncitizen requirements
- Not be suspended or disqualified from participation in federal programs

The Eagle River Water Tower is Getting a Face Lift

The water tower is undergoing an extensive rehabilitation project which is being done to remove existing corrosion and prevent further deterioration on the structure. The project includes a full interior wet area and exterior sandblasting, priming and painting along with a few other upgrades. A shield will be erected around the tower to contain the sandblasting debris. The tower will be painted the same colors with the same lettering. You may have noticed work began the first week of July. The tower is currently empty and offline. The project is expected to take 8-12 weeks to complete.

In preparation for the project, there have been two, 5000-gallon temporary tanks placed on our water system. Our municipal well will cycle more frequently to keep up with the water demand during the day and less frequently at night. You may see a little more fluctuation in water pressure, but the differences should be minimal.

Near the end of maintenance completion, the tower will go thru an interior cleaning, chlorination and water sampling before it is put back online.

The tower has an annual inspection done to monitor for any degradation. Every 5 years the tower is taken offline for a more thorough interior inspection. The water tower was constructed in 1991 and had an interior finish and paint overcoat in 2006.
